#### President's Letter

It hardly seems possible that our Grand Opening was on September 9, 2000, just a year ago! We certainly haven't been sitting around since that time. When driving by you will have noticed the work we have been doing to the outside of the building over the past six months, especially with the completion of the exterior painting.

Doesn't the building look terrific!!!

The painting completed a matching grant project including a \$20,000 grant from Oregon Heritage Commission and \$10,000 from The Oregon Community Foundation. The Museum added \$33,000 from its own funds to complete the \$63,000 project which included some brick repair on the North side, a new roof, metalwork and flashing on the inside walls of the building down to the roof level, and finally the outside painting.

It would seem as if we could now sit back and relax for a while, but there are always other projects going on in the Museum, so come in and visit and look around.


Again, I have to say that this could not have happened without your support and contributions through donations of money; individual, family and business memberships; donated time, labor and expertise. It was, and is, greatly appreciated and has helped us to meet the goals we set out as a Board to accomplish during our first year in the building.

#### Looking Back by Jack Gillespie

#### \$2.00 Gasoline Perspective

Earlier this year gasoline prices were wavering toward the \$2.00-a-gallon mark before tapering off.

Taken in perspective, \$2.00-a-gallon gasoline would still be cheaper than it was over 50 years ago.

In 1947 I bought, for \$165 and a tradein of my Western Flyer bicycle, my first car—a 1929 Dodge coupe, complete with rumble seat. At the time I was working after school and on Saturdays at the Ben Franklin Variety Store (at the location of the present Weatherford Law Offices). I was paid the then-minimum wage of 50 cents an hour.

In 1947 the cost of a gallon of gas ranged from 20 cents (a Hancock Station on the SW corner of Main and First offered 5 gallons for \$1.00) to 25 cents a gallon for the better brands.

I had to work almost half an hour to have money for one gallon of gasoline.

Automobiles, new or old, did not get very good gas mileage in those days. My 6-cylinder Dodge got about 12 miles a gallon. Any car that got 20 miles a gallon was considered a "jewel."

Today, earners of a minimum wage of about \$8.00 an hour have to work less than 15 minutes for a gallon of gasoline—and most all cars and small trucks get well over 20 miles per gallon.

The typical working family of today probably spends more of their spendable income on automobiles, gasoline, insurance and maintenance than they did over 50 years ago; but \$2.00-a-gallon gasoline is just about equal to inflation.

Hail Al-ba-ny


City of our homes so dear, Hail Al-ba-ny

How about a cure for lung trouble? One of our long-time volunteers, Rosemary Scholblom,

shared some of her Grandmother Hanke's recipes with me. Again, do not try this. This column is all about interesting facts and fiction of long ago and, for most of the time, not to share recipes to actually use.


Here is the recipe for lung trouble.

"Take 1 pound whole clean flaxseed and place in a granite kettle, add 3 quarts of cold water, cover tight and boil gently for 2 hours add 6 clean lemons, large ones, sliced very thin and boil half hour longer or until the lemons are very soft keeping tightly covered all the time. Then strain through double white cheese cloth, return syrup to the kettle, add 1 lb. of pure bees honey wax and all braking it up finely, let boil up once or twice, strain again and fill into bottle, keep in cool place.


"To use, start with one teaspoonful 3 times a day before meals and increase until you can stand 1 tablespoonful every 2 hours. Avoid drinking anything for about a half hour after a dose. It may require 2 fillings of this prescription but it will positively cure if minutely followed."

Unfortunately, Rosemary didn't find this recipe until after her Grandmother had died. So she wasn't able to ask her if the cure **really** worked.


The Museum's new paint and lettering is patterned on the 1912 after-relocation paint scheme.
