## ALBANY HISTORIC RESOURCES OFFICE OPENS

To respond to an ever-increasing need to coordinate and assist the many and varied historical groups in Albany, leaders of these organizations appealed to the Albany Convention and Visitors Commission to fund a half-time position for a director of historic resources. The Commission approved funding and hired Rosalind Clark Keeney as director in September, 1985. The position is funded by transient room tax revenues.

The principal tasks assigned to the director include: improving communications among the historical groups and their counterparts throughout the state, serving as public relations coordinator for the historic groups, assisting in the preparation and organization of their special events, recruiting and organizing volunteers, obtaining money through fundraising efforts and grants, and developing educational programs about Albany's history.

The Albany Historic Resources Office is located in the basement of the downtown public library in the Albany Regional Museum, 302 S.W. Ferry Street. For information about Albany's historic groups, museums, tours, events, historic preservation of historic research, call 967-6540.

ALBANY HISTORIC ASSOCIATION STRENGTHENS ALBANY'S HISTORY GROUPS

The Albany Historic Association (AHA) is an umbrella organization made up of people and organizations interested in Albany's historic resources. It was established three years ago to better organize the historic community and to speak with a united voice to the powers that be instead of with many soft voices

with mixed messages. It was very successful in establishing the historic groups'importance in Albany's tourism and convinced the city council that a portion of the transient room tax needed to be used to improve and promote historic-related projects in Albany.

The association's board of directors is composed of the presidents and leaders of Albany's historic groups. They are: Joy Henkle from the Monteith Society; Lynda Cook from the Interior Tour Committee; Linda Tedisch from the Albany Fire Museum; Jan Shea from the Friends of Historic Albany; Lois Baker from Experience Albany; and Beth Powell from the Albany Regional Museum. The Director of Historic Resources serves as coordinator. Each month the board and the director meet to discuss events and problems.

One organization representing all the groups will make it easier to apply for grants, plan fundraisers and events, hire additional personnel, and coordinate volunteers.

JOHN BURKHART: ALBANY'S THIRD FOUNDING FATHER



You've heard of Burkhart Street, Burkhart Creek, Burkhart Square (the small park next to A.C.T. at 1st and Ellsworth), and the Burkhart House (the park's department "Maple Lawn"), but do you know who the Burkharts were?

Like the Monteiths and the Hacklemans, they were early Albany settlers. John and his wife Rebecca came to the Albany area in 1847, via the Oregon Trail, arriving in October on the same wagon train as Abraham Hackleman (son of Abner).

In 1849, when most able bodied men left Oregon to work in the California gold fields, John, who was by then 62 (born 1787) stayed in Oregon to tend the claims of the Monteiths and Abraham Hackleman. While they were gone he took a claim a few miles east of town, but continued to live in Albany for some time. Four of his sons later took donation land claims in Linn County also.

John and Rebecca had ten children, Raymond, Calvin P., Coriolanus "Crill," Leander, John, George, Charolette, Katherine, Louisa, and Rebecca, all of whom settled in Oregon. Many Burkhart decendents still live in Linn County and around Oregon (there are thirteen now listed in the Albany phone book).

John was the first postmaster in Albany and was an early school commissioner. He died in 1856, his wife in 1884, but their children continued to play significant roles in Albany history. Charolette, was the first woman school teacher in Albany; Calvin P. was one of the instigators of and helped finance the Albany Santiam Canal and assisted in building the first schoolhouse in Albany; Leander's son, Robert L., was a member of the school board and had a statewide reputation as a breeded and dealer in Jersey cattle, and his other son Will ran the drug firm of Burkhart and Lee for many years.


# ALBANY FIRE MUSEUM ENGINE COMPANY NO. 1

# MONTEITH HOUSE HISTORICAL SOCIETY



The Convention and Visitors Commission Director's Office provides information to visitors and produces collateral material for tourism and convention promotion.
